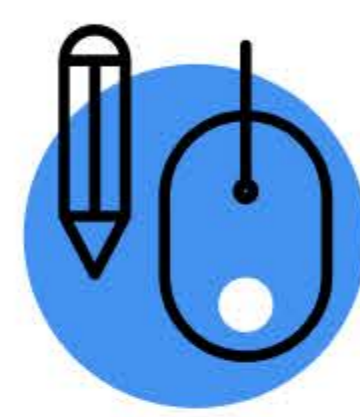
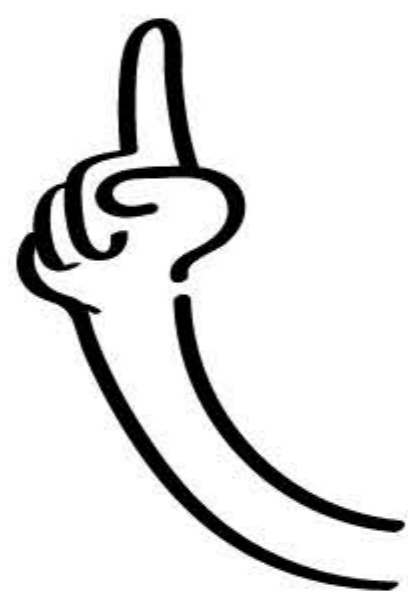

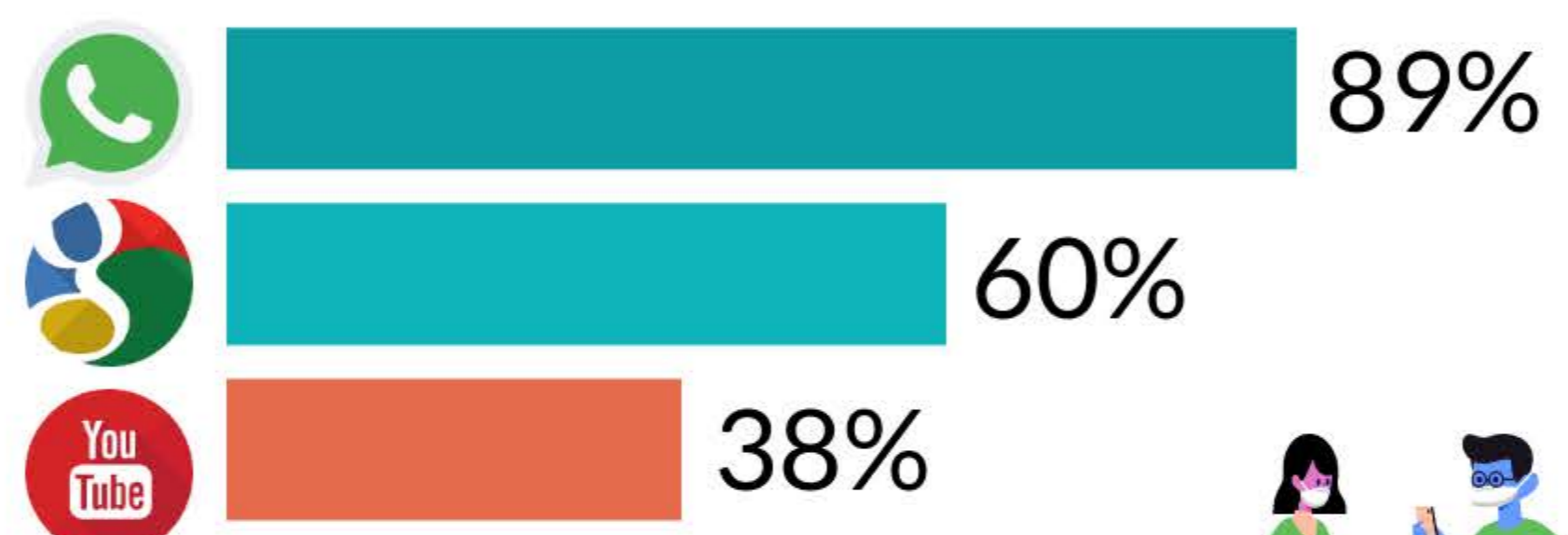

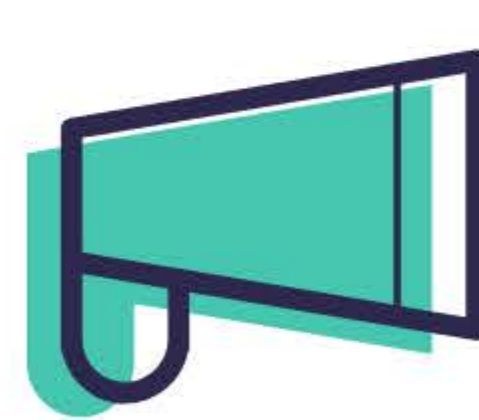

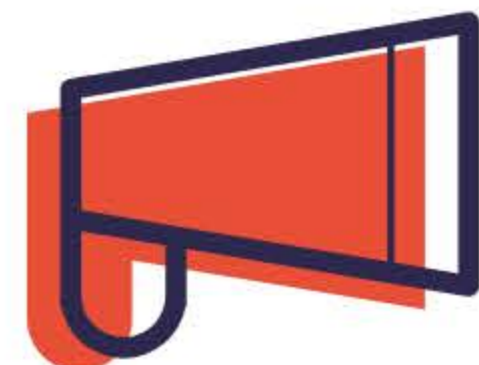

CHALLENGES OF HBL

TOP 5 challenges faced by parents:

- 63% Encounter time to oversee learning instruction due to work or other duties
- 49% Distractions at home
- 42% Slow internet speed
- 36% Difficulty of getting the learning materials
- 35% Volume of learning materials

Overall, majority of the parents believed that it is important for their children to continue learning at home despite MCO



Survey methodology:

A total of 3,170 respondents all over Malaysia comprised of 2,606 females and 564 males who have school going children aged 7 to 18 were surveyed between 25th April and 1st May 2020.
